








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# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

#### In Ros' own words......

Initially, upon retiring I became a volunteer teacher of English to refugees and asylum seekers, which was both enjoyable and rewarding. Wanting also to continue learning, I studied Auslan for a year at Melbourne Polytechnic. Then last year I enrolled in three courses at U3A Waverley: French Conversation Intermediate. Understanding Linguistics, and Music and the Brain. They were all so interesting, and I learned a lot. This year I am excited to be continuing with French, and starting Astronomy and Choir. There are so many fascinating courses to choose from!



Over the last year, I came to appreciate the value of U3A and what it has to offer to the community. Among retired and semi-retired folk, there is a wealth of knowledge and experience. It is wonderful that some of these people are choosing to share their expertise with others, and U3A provides a platform for this to happen. Brian composed a gracious and interesting letter of thanks to me in response – extracts of which appear below. Extracts from Brian's letter...

I have been a member of U3A Waverley for over 30 years, since my retirement from Senior Engineering and Corporate activities in both Commonwealth and State Governments.

My retirement was unfortunately an unhappy and abrupt event, and for some

time I was devoid of motivation and activity. Then I discovered U3A and U3A Waverley, filled which amply an intellectual. educational, creative and entertainment void.

I absorbed the essential nature of worldwide U3A, which encourages life-long learning, social interaction, and volunteering. I volunteered my skills in several areas. including technical support for equipment maintenance and construction. I did make a difference:

examples of my practical work are still being used in U3A Waverley activities.

I found that my desire to learn, and my technical curiosity led to developing (on typically two technical average) presentations each year for my Science and Technology class, learning audio-visual skills such as PowerPoint along the way.

I found this to be a thoroughly rewarding process, from which many U3A members could benefit.

This was in the era when the late Jack McDonell, who helped to bring U3A to Australia, was still Tutor for the Science and Technology class, producing fascinating presentations weekly.

When Jack relinquished this role. I was one of several who volunteered to carry on the tutoring task.

I enjoyed attending several U3A classes, including Science and Technology, Music Appreciation. Armchair Travel. and occasional short courses.

I decided to volunteer as a joint Tutor (for Armchair Travel) with Ray (Wall), this time using U3A Waverley's newly introduced Internet facilities, and a Chromecast plus video device already used in my home. This concept enables a plethora of more modern and recent travel videos to be sourced from YouTube

U3A Waverlev's purchase of a Chromecast plus video device has since enhanced the activities of several U3A Waverley classes. I continue to gain great pleasure and intellectual enrichment from U3A Waverley classes.

Now aged 90, I enjoy the company of like-minded people, and I hope I can continue

contributing.

# **Subject: Jewish Scriptures and Writings**

Course Code: 25 HUM024

Delivery: Via Zoom on Wednesday on Zoom

10.30 - 12.30

This year we will study selected verses from the Torah (Genesis to Deuteronomy) to try to understand concepts that underpin Jewish ethics and continue to be of great importance to societal well-being today. Topics will include: free will and God's role in history; idolatry and the problem of evil; war and peace; affluence and human hubris; gratitude and the sin of joylessness; and stewardship of God's gifts. Discussions will reference the Hebrew Prophets, the Psalms, the books of Job and Ecclesiastes, plus the writings of sages and rabbis from the Talmud (e.g. Hillel and Shammai), through medieval times (e.g. Ibn Ezra and Moses Maimonides), to the modern era (e.g. Martin Buber, the late Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks) and current Israeli and Australian thinkers.

Most sessions will begin with a segment called "Israel matters", with updates about events in Israel and the Jewish world. Jewish religious festivals will also be highlighted as they occur during the year. The course is for non-Jewish people and will suit both new and returning participants. In keeping with Jewish tradition, questions and discussion are welcome, the only requirement being mutual respect. This is a year-long course, conducted on Zoom, weekly on Wednesdays, from 10.30 am to 12.30 pm. The course is hosted by U3A Waverley, with members of other U3As also participating. 
### **New Addition to DVD Library**


